A Message from the CEO/President and Board Chair



With each passing year, we are humbled by the impact Lighthouse of Broward has had on the visually impaired and blind in our community. Thanks to our donors, sponsors and dedicated staff and board of directors, our programs continue to soar.

In 2025, we served 878 new clients while serving a total of 3,075 clients. We are so proud of the fact that all of our programs saw a double digit percentage increase over the previous year. What's even more heartwarming is the extraordinary impact we have had:

- In our Bright Beginnings Early Intervention Program, parents remained actively involved in their child's development, ensuring a strong foundation for future success.
- We saw 100% of participants, youth ages 6–13, in our David & Jean Colker KIDS Program improve daily living skills, social interactions and self-determination while gaining proficiency in STEAM activities and safe travel techniques.
- TeenLIFE, for youth ages 14–21 recorded a 50% increase in participants over the previous year.
- The Ready to Work Program internship component, now entering its fifth year, has been transformative raising the employment rate of participants from 30% to 50%.
- Through Vital Living 96% of seniors ages 55 and older in the program improved daily living and communication skills, 91% reported greater confidence in life decisions and 100% maintained independence or living in supportive environments.

On a personal note, we would like to acknowledge our exceptional Lighthouse staff, our incredibly dedicated board of directors, our amazing sponsors and donors and all who attended and supported our two annual events. We raised a record \$262,678.02 from Dining in the Dark and \$70,403.83 from our Heroes event. We are so deeply grateful for the love and support for Lighthouse of Broward.

We continue to settle into our new building in Sunrise, upgrading and renovating our new space to meet our needs well into the future. At the same time, we are expanding our marketing outreach and growing our social media presence because while we have positively impacted the lives of the 3,075 individuals we served in 2025, there are still more than 175,000 residents living with vision loss in Broward County and that number is predicted to grow as our population ages.

As always, we will continue to be guided by our mission which is to be the leader in providing the services, advocacy, and resources necessary to enhance the lives of people who are blind and visually impaired, empowering them to live independent, healthy, employed, and fulfilling lives.

Thank you for all of your support. It is because of you that in a world of darkness, we are the light.

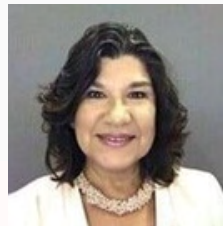

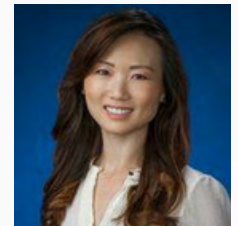

Programs that Moved the Needle

The Lighthouse of Broward served **3,075 people** who are visually impaired and blind in 2025, including **878 new clients**, unduplicated, through a variety of programs and initiatives.



Bright Beginnings is a year-round developmental and support program for parents and children aged from birth through five years old.

Clients served: 43 – a 19% increase over 2024

Impact: The program continued to deliver strong outcomes, with all children effectively engaging with assistive technology, building socialization skills, and maintaining focus on sensory-stimulating activities. Parents remained actively involved in their child's development, ensuring a strong foundation for future success.

David & Jean Colker KIDS Program is a year-round program that provides a summer camp, weekend activities each month, and school holidays during the school year for 6- to 13-year-olds.

Clients served: 77 – a 28.3% increase over 2024

Impact: Through the program, 100% of participants improved daily living skills, social interactions and self-determination while gaining proficiency in STEAM activities and safe travel techniques. Parents reported stronger advocacy skills and reduced stress, highlighting the dual impact on children and families.

TeenLIFE (Learning Independence From Experience) is a year-round program for teens and young adults aged 14 to 21 that achieved notable growth. It focuses on career exploration, job readiness, work experience, daily living skills and college preparation.

Clients served: 96 – an increase of 50% over 2024

Impact: Through hours of group training and individual instruction, participants gained essential independence and career-readiness skills. The program prepared teens and young adults to transition confidently into adulthood, supporting their academic, vocational and personal goals.

Ready to Work provides working-age adults with skills training, job preparation, placement services, and ways to overcome barriers to gain employment and reduce the effects of vision loss on job performance.

Clients served: 204

Impact: Through extensive instruction, 95.65% of participants improved essential skills in daily living, mobility and adaptive technology and 75% developed professional resumes and interview skills. The program's internship component, now entering its fifth year, has been transformative in raising the employment rate of participants from 30% to 50%. Of those completing internships this year, half secured employment, reflecting the program's continued success in breaking down barriers to meaningful work.

Vital Living serves seniors who participate in group and individual rehabilitation training, enabling them to maximize their independence, well-being, and health. Vital Living helps the elderly age in place and learn skills empowering them to remain safe and live independently.

Clients served: 338

Impact: Of the seniors completing the training, 96% improved daily living and communication skills, 91% reported greater confidence in life decisions, and 100% maintained independence or living in supportive environments. In all, we have 2,042 Lifetime Learners graduates of this program.

Visually Impaired Seniors using Technology (VISIT) and Family Support Group offers training at the Sunrise Senior Center, with weekly two-hour sessions in six-week cycles for small groups of five to seven seniors. The off-site model increased accessibility for those facing transportation or mobility challenges, and expansion to additional Broward County centers is being explored.

Combined clients served: 120

Impact: This year, VISIT services expanded to include training sessions at the City of Sunrise Senior Center, improving access to support and instruction for seniors who are blind or visually impaired.

NSU Vision Clinic assists low-vision clients and the public in partnership with Nova Southeastern School of Optometry. In-home follow up includes teaching best use of remaining vision with adaptive low vision devices.

Combined clients served: 155

What's Cooking?

The Jim Moran Foundation awarded a transformative \$1 million grant as a part of its 25th anniversary to the Lighthouse of Broward. The new kitchen will serve as a cornerstone of independence training for individuals living with vision loss – teaching essential daily living skills such as safely preparing meals, operating kitchen appliances, and using sharp tools with confidence and control. For individuals who are blind or visually impaired, a teaching kitchen is more than just a room – it's a place where confidence is built, fears are overcome, and dignity is restored through the mastery of everyday tasks many take for granted.

Full STEAM Ahead

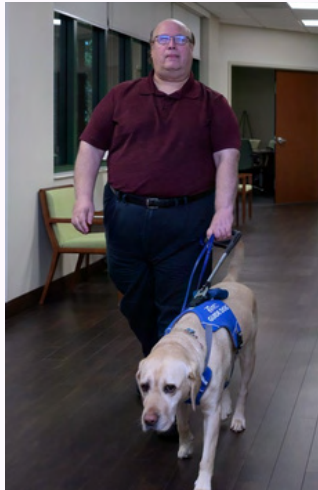
